Birdies of a Different Feather at Boundary Oak

Boundary Oak Golf Course has a long-standing commitment to wildlife conservation. Back in the early 2000's, the course installed six barn owl boxes as a natural way to manage rodent populations, reducing chemical use and creating habitat for these nocturnal predators. The initiative was so successful that owls began nesting within the first year, earning Boundary Oak recognition as an Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary. In 2019, the course partnered with local Eagle Scouts to help repair and maintain the boxes.

The focus has expanded to songbirds. Boundary Oak teamed up with local bluebird conservationists and Audubon partners to repair and reinstall 14 bluebird boxes across the 160-acre golf course, enhancing habitat for species like Western Bluebirds. These efforts and other fun updates are celebrated on the course's Instagram (@boundaryoakgolfcourse).

Staff Tip: Rent a golf cart to drive around the beautiful grounds and birdwatch.

Memorial Day event

Join us in Civic Park on Monday, May 25, when the City honors those who paid the ultimate price serving our country. Mayor Kevin Wilk will host the event and share his thoughts. The keynote speaker is retired Army Lt. Col. Karl Davis, whose military career spanned 30 years. As always, the Walnut Creek Concert Band will perform. The event starts at 11 a.m. and runs until approximately noon.

PHASE TWO OF THE AQUATIC AND COMMUNITY CENTER UNDERWAY

Residents visiting Heather Farm are likely noticing more activity around the pools and community center. The next phase of work has begun, with much of the first phase focused on the design and work at the Nature Lake and the Concrete Pond. City Councilmembers grabbed golden shovels in a ceremonial groundbreaking for phase 2.

Demolition of the current Community Center began in February. A number of trees had to be removed for the new alignment of the community center and pools, but significantly more trees will be planted. In keeping with the City's commitment to sustainability and responsible resource management, staff is partnering with Bay Area Redwood to repurpose the removed redwood trees into artisanal wood products.

Meanwhile, the City of Walnut Creek has been awarded a "AAA" credit rating. Bonds will be financing some of the costs of the Heather Farm project, along with significant contributions from Measure O. The "AAA" rating signals the City's exceptional financial health and resulted in the lowest available interest rate for the bonds.

The plan is for the new Aquatic and Community Centers to be open by the end of next year.

Lee Ritenour

April 11

Known widely as “Captain Fingers,” a moniker he earned for his remarkable dexterity and musicianship, he’ll perform at the Leshler Center on April 11. Grammy-winning guitar hero Lee Ritenour began his career as a solo artist and bandleader at the height of the jazz fusion era of the mid-1970s. Still a teenage phenom when performing with the likes of Tony Bennett and Lena Horne, Ritenour made waves on the L.A. studio circuit and released his debut First Course in 1976, the first of 35 albums for the Elektra, GRP, and Concord labels including the career highlights Captain Fingers (1977), Rit (1981), Harlequin (1985), Festival (1988), and 6 String Theory (2010). Ritenour was a founding member of the fusion supergroup Fourplay and has contributed to the music of Patti Austin, Pink Floyd, George Benson, Aretha Franklin, Frank Sinatra, Natalie Cole, Joe Henderson, Steely Dan, Barbra Streisand, and Dizzy Gillespie, among dozens of others.

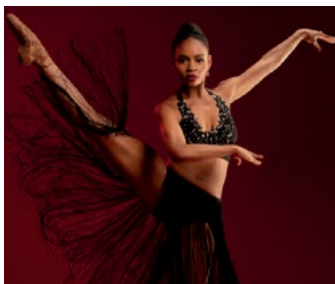

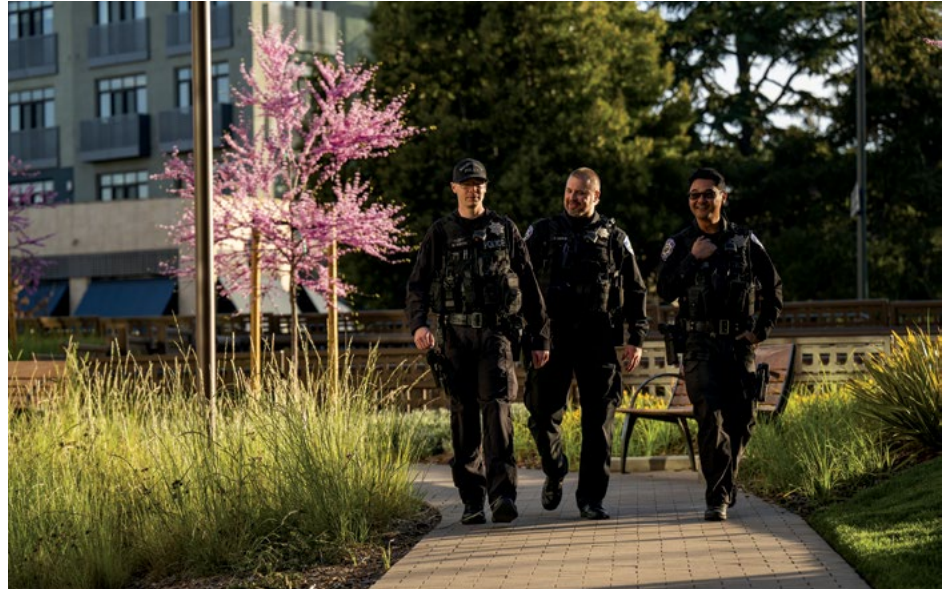
What's New Downtown

The future continues to look bright for downtown Walnut Creek in 2026. While an already established regional destination for shopping, entertainment, arts, unique dining, and nightlife with seven million annual visitors, multiple community festivals, and over 120 restaurants, downtown Walnut Creek continues to reinvent itself.

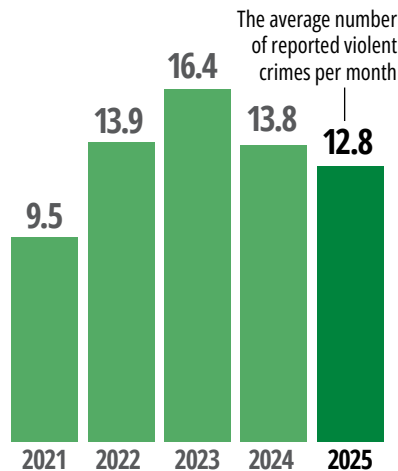
New businesses continue to choose Walnut Creek. Smash Box Golf has introduced an indoor golf simulator experience in Shadelands, and Ruby Lou's Boujee Bites & Games brings a whimsical restaurant concept with games and creative cocktails to downtown. East Coast favorite Duck Donuts is now serving made-to-order treats on North Main, while Beem Light Sauna has opened an infrared sauna studio near the Walnut Creek BART station. After 27 years, the former Yacht Club building is being thoughtfully renovated and will reopen with a new seafood concept.

Seven new outdoor dining parklets have been built in the last month, enhancing dining experiences for patrons and further activating streetscape in anticipation of warmer weather. The newest parklets have been installed at Ramen Hiroshi, Xicote, Broderick, Elia, and Limon following Sasa's installation earlier this year. These projects reflect restaurant owners' optimism about the future of Walnut Creek and are a successful response to the outdoor dining grant program implemented by City Council in July of 2025.

PUBLIC SAFETY TRENDS SHOW POSITIVE RESULTS



Average Monthly Violent Crime



Walnut Creek continues to be a safe place to live, work or visit. Looking back at statistics for 2025, the Police Department saw a 20% overall decrease in crime, with both property and violent crime dropping by that percentage.

2025 by the numbers:

- Residential burglary was down 40%
- Robbery was down 37%
- Vehicle theft was down 17%
- Shoplifting was down 28%
- Auto burglary was down 6%

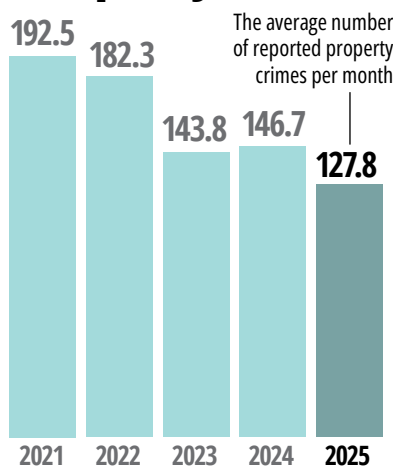
The City did see an increase in both homicide and rape, but the totals for each continue to remain low.

"I am extremely proud of the strong work done by the Walnut Creek Police Department in both preventing crime and investigating it," said Chief Ryan Hibbs. "Our mission is simple," Hibbs said, "to protect and serve our community with integrity, professionalism, and respect."

Another element of their work involves community policing, getting to know residents in less formal settings, such as the monthly "Coffee with a Cop" sessions. Community policing is built on planning, providing strong public safety services, and a sincere partnership with Walnut Creek residents. Chief Hibbs also welcomes feedback from the community, hosting the Chief's Community Advisory Board. The Board advises the Chief on community policing strategies, engagement, transparency and best practices.

Fundraiser for Las Lomas golf teams

On Monday, April 20th, golfers from all walks of life will gather at Rossmoor Golf Club to play in the inaugural "Knights on the Green" Golf Tournament benefiting the Las Lomas High School Boys and Girls Golf Teams. The 9-hole twilight scramble will begin at 3:00 p.m., and includes a Silent Auction and dinner catered by Sunrise Bistro. While golf continues to grow in popularity, high school teams struggle to keep up with the rising costs of reserving practice time at courses, uniforms and equipment. Athletic programs in the Acalanes Union High School District receive no funding from the District - all programs are funded by parents and through community fundraising efforts. Additionally, as the only High School in the district that does not practice at a private club, Las Lomas golfers would like more practice time. The program has a long-term goal to build an on-site training area at Las Lomas, reducing travel time to practice courses and enabling more consistent training.



"We are excited to host our first ever Golf tournament to raise much needed funds for our Las Lomas Golf Teams," said Rob Killoran, Boys Golf Coach. "Golf not only is great exercise but requires in-person social interactions and a high degree of etiquette with teammates and fellow competitors. Golf teaches honesty, integrity and perseverance - all crucial skills as our students move on to college, careers and their lives ahead. New look coming for Civic Park and Walden Park playgrounds



KEEPING WALNUT CREEK'S playgrounds safe, welcoming, and fun is no small task. City staff maintain 16 playground structures across the community, following the City's Municipal Maintenance Master Plan to guide long-term care, maintenance, and timely replacement of playground equipment.

As part of this ongoing effort, the City Council approved \$500,000 in In-Lieu Parkland Funds in the 2024–25 Capital Budget to replace aging playground equipment at Civic Park and Walden

Park. These popular playgrounds, originally installed in 1997 and last renovated in 2015, are well loved and ready for their next refresh.

Community input played a key role in shaping the updates. Staff reached out to residents to help select new playground designs, presenting three options for both the 2–5 and 5–12 age group play areas. The response was strong, with nearly 600 community members participating in an online voting poll. This feedback helped guide decisions on the features, layout, and

overall look of the new playgrounds.

The survey was shared through multiple outreach efforts, including the Downtown Locust Street Festival, community pop-up events, and the City's official website, ensuring many voices had the opportunity to be heard.

With community feedback in hand, staff are moving forward with plans to bring refreshed, modern playgrounds to Civic Park and Walden Park—spaces designed for years of climbing, sliding, and imaginative play ahead.

Painted Pianos encore

“Painted Pianos” returns to downtown Walnut Creek with a festive kickoff celebrating art, music, and community. During the April 18–19 kickoff weekend, local artists and community members will paint the pianos live. Come watch the creative process unfold or even volunteer to help paint. 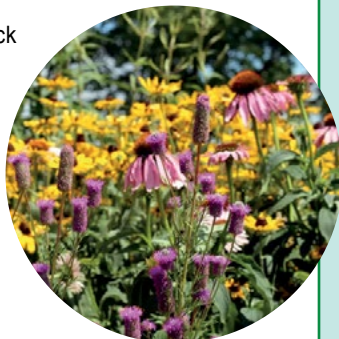
Consider Water-wise Gardens

For the first time since December 2000, all of California is considered drought-free. With the winter's generous rainfall, it is important to make the most of this precious resource. One effective way to retain rainwater is to create a rain garden.

Rain gardens are areas of land with a shallow depression that collect rainwater that falls on your property. These water-wise gardens help decrease the amount of polluted stormwater runoff that ends up in drains, ponds, and creeks. As water slowly seeps into the soil, it is naturally filtered through the absorption and trapping of contaminants. This process helps purify the water, while reducing the need for frequent landscape irrigation.

Native plants are one of the best options for creating a beautiful rain garden. They have excellent root systems for collecting water deep down, require minimal maintenance, and contribute to local biodiversity.

Curious about what a native plant garden might look like? Check out a "Bringing Back the Natives" Garden tour. On Sunday, May 3, various gardens across Walnut Creek and the Bay Area will be open for public tours. This is a great opportunity to take a peaceful stroll surrounded by native wildlife or unlock inspiration for your own home garden. Visit bringingbackthenatives.net/view-gardens to learn more.

KNOW YOUR WALNUT CREEK PARKS:

Lime Ridge Open Space

WITH MORE THAN 1,200 ACRES AND 25 MILES OF TRAILS, Lime Ridge is the second largest Open Space area in Walnut Creek. It is located on the eastern edge of Walnut Creek on a dominant ridge leading to Mount Diablo. It is connected to other Open Space areas by the Shell Ridge to Lime Ridge Trail, and the broader paved trail system.

It contains some of the last remaining chaparral in Walnut Creek and is home to a rich diversity of plant and animal life. Lime Ridge gets its name from the limestone in the area that was quarried by the Cowell Portland Cement Company. Remnants of the company's operation can be seen at various locations. This quarry was originally started as a supply line to manufacture the bricks that were used to rebuild San Francisco after the 1906 fires. About 20% of Lime Ridge is owned by the City of Concord, but it is under the management and control of Walnut Creek.



This regional space provides opportunities for hiking, biking, horseback riding and sightseeing.

Due to the rich diversity of plants and animals, this Open Space has specific regulations in place to protect those resources. Dogs are allowed in most parts of Lime Ridge, except for the center section south of Ygnacio. This is the Lime Ridge Wildlife Preserve Area. In other parts, leash rules vary depending upon what section you visit, and rangers recommend dogs always remain on leash. When off leash, they must be under positive voice control from their owners at all times.

Lime Ridge is open from dawn to dusk, with the parking lots open at 7:00 a.m. Parking lots are located at the intersection of Ygnacio Valley Road and Montecito Ranch Road, and at the end of Valley Vista near the Boundary Oak driving range. On a clear day, you can see the Benicia Bridge and other Bay Area landmarks from Lime Ridge.
